Membership Update

Our membership continues to decline in number. We are now down to 243 members, a loss of 35 members this year. Progress On Our Web Site

GMCWS.org has changed. All of the old information is still available but some pretty drastic changes have been made. Our objectives for the new site are to improve communications and to reduce the amount of administrative work required to maintain our membership information.

Every membership now has a unique *Username* on the web site and, using that *Username*, can access a current copy of the membership roster in the 'members only' section of the site. In addition, members can comment on articles published on the site. Most importantly to us (your highly paid President and Secretary) you can maintain your own membership information without our involvement and save us lots of phone calls and paperwork – we would appreciate the help. We have been including your User Profile data – including your *Username* - as part of our emails. Keep a copy so you can refer to it when logging in. Your *Password* is up to you – if you cannot remember it, enter your *Username* and click on "Forgot password" and a new one will be emailed to you.

For the first time we have the ability to join the club or to renew memberships on the web site completely electronically. During this year's renewal period we had 50 members renew their memberships using PayPal and even had 3 new members join the same way. When you pay using PayPal, their Purchase Protection coverage is included at no extra cost. They offer buyers \$0 Liability for Unauthorized Purchases, refunds for incorrect orders or items that never arrive, and a convenient process for resolving problems. Try it – it is the safest way to pay for things on the internet.

What Do You Weigh and How Tall Are You?

No, we won't embarrass you with measuring your BMI but you will have a chance to see if your rear is dragging or if you weigh too much. Of course we're referring to your coach! Thanks to our President's innovative thinking, the Club has purchased a set of scales to give anyone wishing to, a chance to weigh each set of wheels. Be among the first to use it at our Spring Rally at Casa de Fruta. Jerry Work will have ride height gages to check your coach on arrival. The two measurements will help evaluate handling and steering problems.

Why weigh? Are you carrying too many tools or spare parts? Does the co-pilot want too many comforts of home?

One should set the tire inflation pressure on each axle set, based on the tire manufactures recommendation for the weight. Correct pressure helps ride and handling characteristics by providing the correct tire footprint.

A variation between the front left and right side of more than a couple of hundred pounds can mean that the torsion bar on one side is too tight, even when the ride height is correct. Come find out the truth!

PROPANE SAFETY

Western States Tech Center by Jim Hupy, Technical Vice President

I had a Propane gas supplier come to my shop and install some propane heating equipment the other day and it got me to thinking about Propane Safety in our GMCs. I figured that now might be an appropriate time to discuss proper care and feeding of our propane appliances in our coaches.

Let's start with a discussion of Propane. The technical description of propane is Odorized Commercial Propane. The correct chemical family is Paraffinic Hydrocarbon. The chemical formula is C3H8.

Some Synonyms are Dimethylmethane, LP-Gas, Liquefied Petroleum Gas, (LPG) Propane, Propyl Hydride.

It's ingredient list goes like this:	
Propane/74-98-6	87.5-100
Ethane /74-84-0	0-5.0
Propylene /115-07-1	0-10.0
Butanes/ Various (different blends for summer and winter)	
Ethyl Mercaptan /75-08-1	16-25 ppm

The principal dangers to a person aside from the flammability is from freezing of tissues from contact with propane in sufficient amounts. It has a flash point of -156 degrees F. It will auto ignite at 842 degrees F. It's ignition temperature range when mixed with air is 920-1120 degrees F. It is easily ignited, It is heavier than air, and tends to collect in low areas when it leaks.

In addition to the above contents, an Odorant is added to aid with the detection of leaks. It has a foul smell which reminds some people of rotten eggs or skunks.

Which brings us to the safety concerns.

What should you do if you smell gas?

- 1. Extinguish all flames and all smoking materials.
- 2. DO NOT operate a light switch, telephone, cigarette lighter, gas appliance or thermostat.
- Any spark in the area where propane gas is present may ignite it.
- 3. Get everyone out of the area immediately.
- 4. Shut off the Gas supply at the tank or cylinder.
- 5. Notify a trained person, like a Gas company Rep, Fire fighter or other Haz Mat personnel.
- 6. Have the leak found and repaired
- 7. Check the system for leaks and once confirmed that there are none, relight appliance.

Where are some special areas to be aware of on our GMCs? First of all, the storage tank has fill valves and supply valves, as well as sending units for the gage. The supply valve is similar to the valves used in high pressure compressed gas cylinders. It has a tapered seat, and a tapered plug that moves back and forth when the handle is loosened or tightened. The shaft that is connected to the valve is threaded and screws into the valve body. In addition to the valve that seals the supply in the tank, there is a secondary valve or seal that tightens against a packing nut when the valve is fully open that prevents propane from leaking around the threads. When in use, the tank valve should always be in the fully opened position.

The tank fill valve has a ball check valve that is sealed by the pressure of the gas in the tank as well as a return spring that keeps the ball on the seat when the tank is not being filled. These ball checks have been known to stick and leak. After your tank has been filled, you should check for leaks by spraying a mixture of dishwashing detergent and water on the valve and look for signs of bubbles. If there is no leak, no bubbles should be present.

Other places to check in your GMC is the plumbing that connects the tank to the appliances. You may have a furnace, water heater, range, oven, refrigerator, barbeque, to name a few of the appliances. Any place that a connection is made to the supply line is a possible leak, and should be checked with the soapy water.

Most appliances also have a manual valve that shuts off the supply. Leak check these also, they are known to be sources of leaks. Range burner control valves when they get a bit worn, are also a source. Some common sense should apply when your propane tank is being filled. Stop your motor in the coach and turn off all appliances. Obviously, no smoking within 50 feet of the supply truck.

There are gas sniffer detectors that are available to be installed in your motor home. They should be installed in a low area on the coach. The Royales have them installed near the entrance door, down low near the floor. I have seen them located in similar locations in other models. There are at least two kinds, ones that are powered from the 12 volt system in your coach and others that are battery operated. Most of them have a button that can be pressed that checks to see if they work.

Perhaps you have asked the question, "Should I turn off the Propane tank when the coach is under way?" Most instruction manuals that I have seen DO NOT RECOMMEND operating the coach with the tank valve open. I personally do not operate my coach with it open but I have a heat exchanger in the hot water heater that provides hot water when under way. Some people operate their gas water heaters when under way so that they have hot water when they reach their destination. I figure that with the flexing and the other forces acting on the coach when it is being driven, that it is better to err on the side of safety.

Finally, a large number of GMCs that I have seen have been modified a great deal and that includes in some cases moving the propane tank location. I find it often in coaches that came with the raised floor and dinette on the passenger side that makes into a bed. Owners want to remove the dinette and replace it with chairs. The propane tank normally resides under the dinette in a metal lined compartment that has an access door on the passenger side of the coach. The most often used location that I have encountered is in the rear storage compartment on the passenger side. The propane lines then get run through the rear wheel wells. If your coach has been modified like this, some of the modifications do not offer any protection to the supply line in the vicinity of the tires. If a blowout will tear up the side of your coach it will also tear up your propane supply line. Make very sure that the line is protected by running it through a heavy tube and that it is secured with clamps that protect it from vibration damage. Most propane lines on motor homes are copper tubing. It is subject to work hardening and vibration cracking as it ages. Crawl under there and check it once in a while. Spray a little soapy water on it while you are under there. Another consideration is when the tank is relocated, there is not sufficient venting in the new location to vent any leaks that might occur. The original location has fairly large holes in the bottom of the compartment that allow propane to vent, as well as doors that contain louvers that allow for an air exchange. Remember, Propane is heavier than air and seeks out the lowest point. If the compartment is properly vented, it will not build up to a dangerous level before you can smell it and check if it is leaking.

Be safe out there, use common sense, enjoy your GMC and I hope to see you at a Rally somewhere in the future.
